**Open Veins of Latin America, by Eduardo Galeano**

Organizes the various facets of Latin American history according to the patterns of five centuries of exploitation, fusing scientific analysis with the passions of a plundered and suffering people.

***Bitter Fruit* by John Coatsworth**

Now a classic, this is a comprehensive and insightful account of the CIA operation to overthrow the democratically elected government of Jacobo Arbenz of Guatemala in 1954

***The Guatemala Reader*, by Grandin, Levenson, and Oglesby**

200 texts, including many on the political and cultural struggle, but also poems, jokes, recipes, art, songs, etc.

***I, Rigoberta Menchú: An Indian Woman in Guatemala*, by Rigoberta Menchú**

Menchú vividly conveys the traditional beliefs of her community and her personal response to feminist and socialist ideas

***A Short History of Guatemala*, by Ralph Woodward**

Briefly synthesizes the exciting history of Guatemala from its ancient Maya heritage to the present, with emphasis on modern history

***Toxic Charity*, by Robert Lupton**

Toxic Charity provides proven new models for charitable groups who want to help—not sabotage—those whom they desire to serve.

***The Art of a Political Murder: Who Killed the Bishop?***

When human rights activist Bishop Juan Gerardi is murdered in 1998, a group of young men began detective work. A true story about a fight for justice.

***When Helping Hurts: How to Alleviate Poverty Without Hurting the Poor... and Yourself*, by Steve Corbett**

Examining potential pitfalls of service work and proven strategies that challenge us to serve in a way that promotes empowerment.

Examines medical systems and institutions in three K'iche' Maya communities to reveal the conflicts between indigenous medical care and the Guatemalan biomedical system

Recognition of the problem of indoor air pollution and its deleterious effects of health

***Maya Intellectual Renaissance: Identity, Representation, and Leadership***

Studies revitalization of Maya culture through identity, representation, and leadership

***Tecpan Guatemala: A Modern Maya Town in Global and Local Context***

Case study of a highland town as it confronts the changes brought by religion, language, the recent civil war, agriculture. Individual chapters can be selected for topic.

A very skeptical speech given in 1968 toward students going on a mission to Mexico

Very up-to-date and includes interesting and relevant political news

An intriguing piece that encourages the international volunteer to have some skepticism and to be cautious when choosing a place to volunteer

A very provocative, easy read that requires introspection of the reader

Includes brief situation analyses of health, food security, environment, economics, and democracy
